This includes any trip you make on foot and any trip where you use a bicycle, scooter, wheelchair, or other assistive device to help you move. Active Transportation is often used to reach buses and trains for longer journeys. This map shows how to get around Lancaster County. It includes comfortable places to bike or walk, bus routes, and train stations.

This map supports the Lancaster Active Transportation Plan (ATP). It shows how walking, rolling, and riding buses or trains connects communities across Lancaster County.

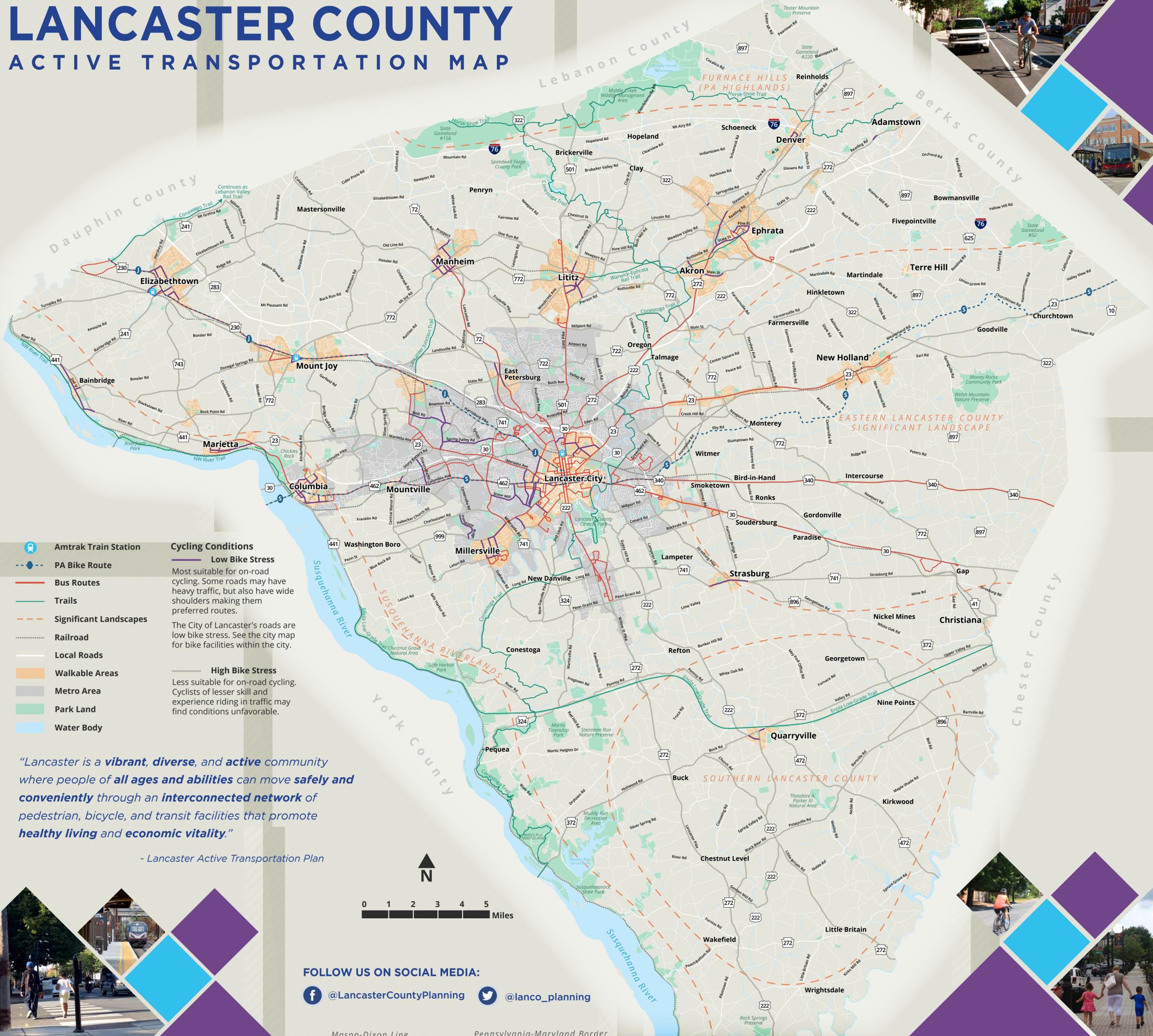

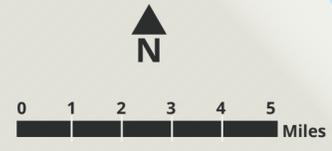

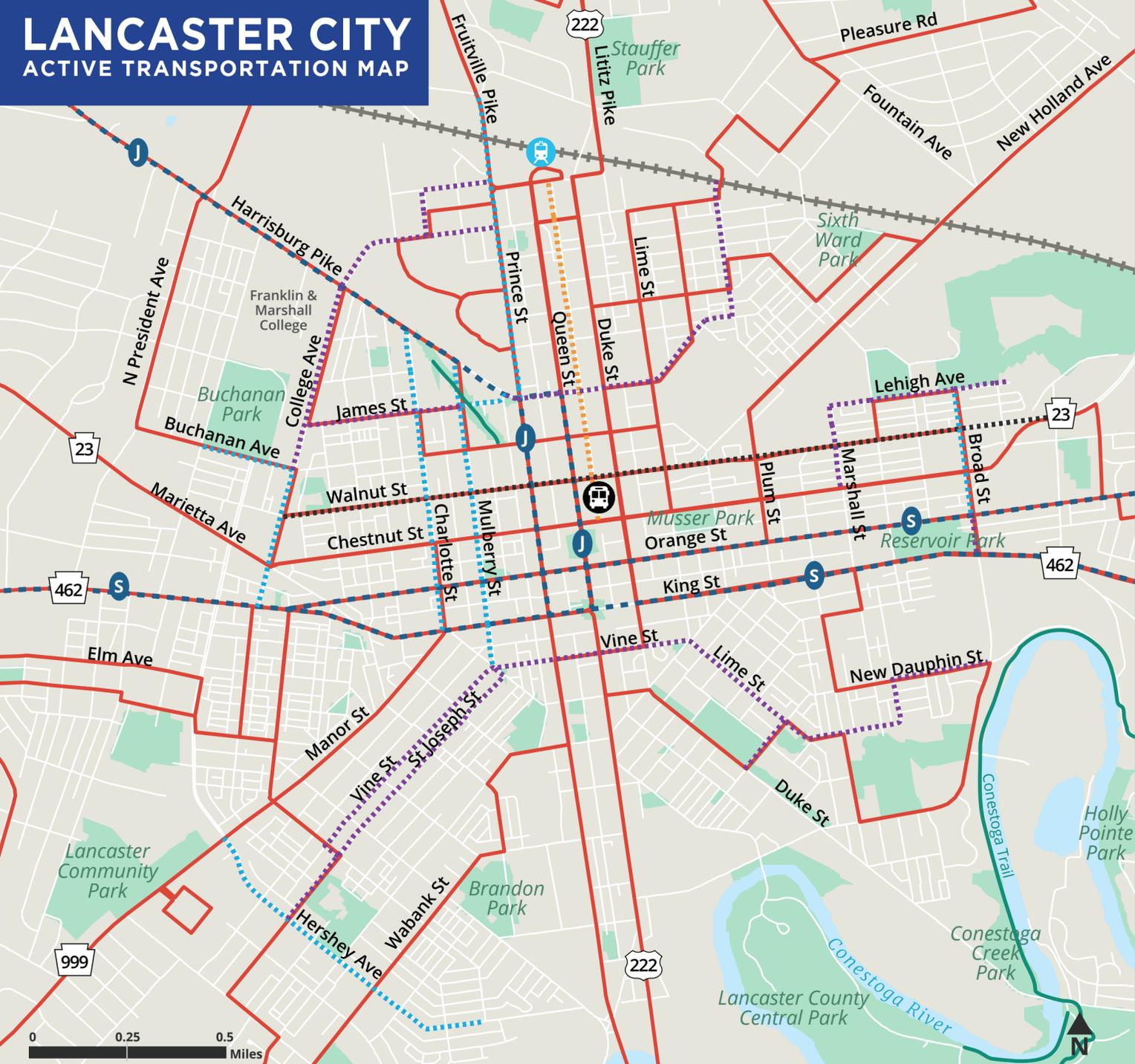


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Mason-Dixon Line Pennsylvania-Maryland Border



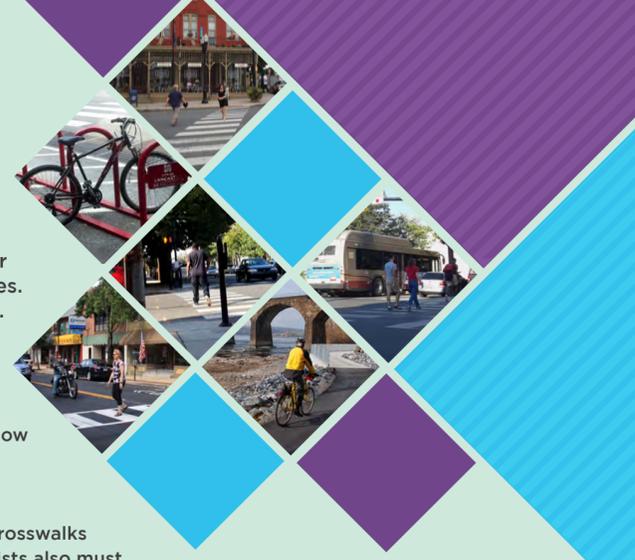
LANCASTER CITY ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION MAP



SAFETY TIPS

BE AWARE

- 1 Pay attention to vehicles.** Regardless of laws and intentions, vehicles present a danger to people in their path. The best way to be safe is to be aware of nearby vehicles. Keep from being distracted – don't look at your phone and listen to music out loud rather than using headphones. Look both ways every time you cross the street – left, right, left.
- 2 Follow traffic signals and signs.** Pedestrians should use crosswalks and follow pedestrian signals at intersections. Bicyclists should follow vehicle laws. They include you must only pass other vehicles on the left, use turning signals, and follow traffic signals and stop signs.
- 3 Know your right-of-way.** Pedestrians have the right-of-way when using sidewalks, trails, and crosswalks appropriately. In Pennsylvania, cars must yield to pedestrians. Bicyclists also must yield to pedestrians. They should give an audible signal before overtaking and passing a pedestrian on a sidewalk or trail.



BE VISIBLE

- 4 Stand out day and night.** Wear bright colors. At night, wear reflective materials and carry a flashlight or use headlights or use front and rear lights plus side reflectors.
- 5 Make eye contact.** Never assume a driver sees you. Make eye contact to check if a driver has noticed you.
- 6 Move predictably.** Try not to make sudden changes in direction – especially in crosswalks, at intersections, and other places where motor vehicles may travel.

BE DELIBERATE

- 7 Plan your trip.** Planning your route can help you avoid the dangers of busy roads, confusing intersections, inaccessible facilities, and uncomfortable infrastructure. Bicyclists should also plan to stay safe on the road. They are encouraged to wear a helmet, gloves and sunscreen. You should be equipped with a water bottle, spare inner tube, tools, and a pump to repair a flat tire. Personal ID with an emergency contact name and number is helpful in case of emergency.
- 8 Travel on your part of the road or path.** When walking use crosswalks and sidewalks where available. Face traffic so you can see oncoming vehicles. Try to avoid roads with heavy traffic flow or no sidewalks when possible. Bicyclists ride with traffic. You can take the full lane or ride in the right shoulder. In Pennsylvania, drivers must give bicyclists 4 feet of space when passing them.
- 9 Stick with what is comfortable for you.** Your safety is very important. If you feel uncomfortable using a particular mode of transportation or uncertain taking a route, take extra caution or try something else. Trust your instincts.

LOADING YOUR BIKE ON THE BUS

Have your bicycle ready to load and free of any loose items. When the bus arrives, indicate to the driver that you will be loading your bike. Use the following steps to secure your bike to the bus rack:



STEP 1 Squeeze the center handle to lower the rack from the upright position.

STEP 2 After lowering the rack, place the bike in the wheel wells.

STEP 3 Pull the security arm over the bike's wheels to keep your bike secure.

CATCHING THE BUS

RRTA bus stop signs are posted along bus routes throughout Lancaster County. In Lancaster City, go to the nearest bus stop for your route and wait for the bus to come to your stop. Outside Lancaster City, if no bus stop sign is nearby, wait on the same side of the street as the bus travels. Wait at a safe area and 'flag' or wave to the operator as the vehicle approaches.

ACCESSIBLE SERVICE

RRTA provides accessible vehicles on all bus routes. RRAT buses have space available for two wheelchair passengers per trip.

BRINGING YOUR BIKE

RRTA has bike racks on all buses to help you get to where you need to go easier. Just ride your bike to the bus stop, put your bike on the bus and hop on board! The bike rack is located in the front of the bus. There is no charge for your bike, just pay your fare and enjoy the rest of your ride on the bus.

RIDING THE TRAIN

The Lancaster, Mount Joy, and Elizabethtown train stations are part of Amtrak's Keystone Service, which provides frequent daily trips between New York City and Harrisburg by way of Philadelphia. The Lancaster train station is also a stop on Amtrak's Pennsylvanian route, a daily service between New York City and Pittsburgh.

ACCESSIBLE SERVICE

All stations in Lancaster County have accessible parking and train platforms with elevator access.

BRINGING YOUR BIKE

Amtrak offers carry-on bicycle service for most Keystone Service trains and a checked bicycle service on Pennsylvanian trains. Be sure to reserve one of the limited spots online or over the phone. This bicycle service is provided for a fee.
